Theme: VORACITY

.....what they learned from the National Christian Camping Workshop!

“Meet Me Outside The Gate” *(A great way to start your camp)*

(Adapted from the Texas Workshop) The first activity after registration is to meet the Camp Director outside the gate of camp. Campers and staff are encouraged to look out over the camp grounds while Exodus 3 is read. Here God tells Moses to “remove his sandals” because he is standing on “holy ground.” All are asked to view the camp site as “holy ground” because God is there and great things are going to happen during the week of camp. Prayer is offered, asking God to fill the camp with His presence. Everyone then steps just inside the gate. We sing two songs, “We Are Standing On Holy Ground” and “This Is Holy Ground.” Another prayer is offered asking again for God’s presence to fill the camp. This sets a high spiritual tone for the week and helps campers and staff to focus on their individual spiritual walk with God.

At Strawberry Point, one of the neatest things we have added to our Teen week schedule over the past couple of years is an item called "Camper Improv". We do it after evening snack and before our evening campfire - each evening. Campers and staff are encouraged to sign up and share some "talent" - and I use that term loosely. Some get up and sing, some do silly skits, others do acrobatic feats - you name it - if it is wholesome - we have probably seen it. What is neat about it, in my opinion, is that campers who otherwise do not stand out - or shine on the ball field, in the canoe, are the most popular - most athletic, most beautiful, etc (as teens are quick to categorize themselves and others) - have an opportunity to shine. To our campers' credit - Camper Improv is 'safe'. We had a camper get up and sing a Broadway musical, another taught us to sing a song in his native French language, another sang to us in Latin - and in every case - our campers responded with respect and affirmation.

We are getting more excited as the months go by and we prepare for seeing our 'camping friends' again and meeting new representatives of Christian camp organizations. We are enlisting all thirteen of our Board of Directors to help make you all feel welcomed and comfortable.

Our youth need natural appetites for the truth!***
